Worship Reflection

How good and pleasant it is when God's people live together in unity! It is like precious oil poured on the head, running down on the beard, running down on Aaron's beard, down on the collar of his robe. It is as if the dew of Hermon were falling on Mount Zion. For there the Lord bestows his blessing, even life for evermore. (Psalm 133)

<u>Prayer</u>: Loving God, as we draw near to you now, teach us that you are with us always, and help us to sense your presence. Remind us again of all that you have done, so that we may trust more fully in all that you will yet do, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Bible Reading (Matthew 15 v 21-28)

Leaving that place, Jesus withdrew to the region of Tyre and Sidon. A Canaanite woman from that vicinity came to him, crying out, 'Lord, Son of David, have mercy on me!



My daughter is demon-possessed and suffering terribly.'

Jesus did not answer a word. So his disciples came to him and urged him, 'Send her away, for she keeps crying out after us.' He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of Israel.'

The woman came and knelt before him. 'Lord, help me!' she said. He replied, 'It is not right to take the children's bread and toss it to the dogs.'

'Yes it is, Lord,' she said. 'Even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master's table.'

Then Jesus said to her, 'Woman, you have great faith! Your request is granted.' And her daughter was healed at that moment.

<u>Reflection</u>: This week's Gospel reading from the cycle of readings used in the Methodist Church, is far from straightforward. Matthew's account seems to show Jesus speaking to the Canaanite woman in an aggressive or confrontational way. What is more, when speaking of his focus on the 'lost sheep of Israel', Jesus uses the derogatory term 'dogs' to refer to Gentiles. However, despite Jesus' words, the woman persists with her request for healing on behalf of her daughter and Jesus appears to make a dramatic U-turn as he not only brings healing to her daughter, but also commends the woman for her 'great faith'.

The Bible scholar R T France, in his commentary on this passage, notes that 'Cold print does not allow us to detect a quizzical eyebrow or a tongue in the cheek and it may be that Jesus's demeanour already hinted that his discouraging reply was not to be his last word on the subject'. France then goes on to say that 'a good teacher may sometimes draw out a pupil's best insight by a deliberate challenge which does not necessarily represent the teacher's own view'.

It is a helpful insight which can enable us to see more clearly what may be going on in this conversation. What is certain is that, earlier in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus has already commended the faith of a Gentile Centurion and has spoken of how people from 'east and west' will come to take their place in the Kingdom of Heaven (See Mathew $8 \vee 5-13$). At the very end of Mathew's Gospel this widespread invitation to all is affirmed in the 'Great Commission' when the risen Jesus commands his followers to go and 'make disciples of all nations' (Matthew $28 \vee 16-20$).

It may well be that if we were able to hear Jesus' intonation and see his facial expression, we might have an insight into his conversation with the Canaanite woman which is not obvious from the 'cold print'. What is clear is that the message of God's salvation made possible in Jesus is indeed offered to all people – to Jew and to Gentile – and to you and to me.

Prayers of Intercession

We pray especially this week for -

- For children and young people as they plan for their return to school and particularly for those receiving examination results that will influence their future plans.
