When we lived in Derbyshire, we took the opportunity to visit Chatsworth House which was only about three miles from where

we lived. The house is the home of the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire and has been passed down through 16 generations of their family.

One of the rooms that visitors can see is a large dining room, where the places are set as if in readiness for a formal evening meal. Each place is set with a large number of knives, forks and spoons to be used in the various courses that would have been served. If you have ever watched 'Downton Abbey' or a similar programme you will be aware of the detailed etiquette of how such meals were served and eaten and the importance of knowing which items of cutlery to use for which particular part of the meal. It would be very easy for someone attending their first

such occasion to feel 'out of place' and that they didn't understand all the 'etiquette' that was involved in such a meal.





learn a new 'etiquette' of how to behave towards each other in order to keep each other safe.

Whether you are planning on coming along when the church buildings reopen, or whether you will be continuing to worship at home as you prayerfully read 'The Anchor', or watch the video reflections, please may I encourage you to pray for the whole church family at this time of change and at a time when we all have to learn a 'new etiquette' for our life as God's worshipping people.

Worship Reflection

Bible Reading (Ephesians 1 v 15-23)

For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all God's people, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people, and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms, far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come. And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.

Reflection

Over the last six months we have been reminded, perhaps as never before in this country, that the church is not the building. The church, as Paul says in his letter to the Ephesians, is the body of Christ. As that body of Christ, the followers of Jesus are bound together in a shared journey of fellowship and discipleship.

In this first chapter of this letter, Paul prays for the Christians in Ephesus. He prays that God will give them 'the Spirt of vision and revelation', that the eyes of their hearts may be enlightened and that they will know 'God's incomparably great power for us who believe'.

At this challenging time in the life of the church we need these same three things. We need God's Spirit, we need God's sight and we need God's strength.

Perhaps you might like to read slowly though the verses of this week's Bible reading, praying those words for all in our church families at Aldershot and North Camp. Pray that, as we seek to be the followers of Jesus today, we might be bound together as the body of Christ and so reveal Jesus through the way we live.

Prayers of Intercession

We pray especially this week -

- For each other as we re-open our buildings for worship.
- For those who want to meet with others for worship, but who, for very good reasons, need to continue to worship at home.

Gracious God, we ask these prayers through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord and Saviour. Amen
